## "INTRODUCTION"



### **Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan (NYKS) -**

The scheme of Nehru Yuva Kendra (NYK) for each district was started by Government of India in the year 1972. The Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan came into existence in 1987 as an autonomous body of the Central Government which is presently functioning under Department of Youth Affairs, Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports. Since 1972, there has been a phenomenal growth in the existing number of Nehru Yuva Kendras which are functional to-day in as many as 623 districts of the country. Further, in order to manage, administer and run the 623 district based Nehru Yuva Kendras, State Offices in 29 States of India have been established by NYKS.

The principal objective of NYKS is to mobilize, motivate, organize youth of the country and enhance their capacities to develop democratic institutional mechanisms in the form of village based Youth Clubs. It is to further develop and empower them to become productive and responsible citizens, assume local leadership to act as active partners in the process of community development and nation building activities with the spirit of equity, secularism and voluntarism.

The core strength of NYKS is a network of 2.55 Lakh village level Youth Clubs across India with an enrolment of about 50.80 Lakh rural youth volunteers. It has become one of the largest Youth organizations in the world. These Youth Clubs are engaged in the areas like education, training, awareness generation, leadership and personality development for addressing social issues, community development and social welfare activities.

The Government of India through its rural youth based flagship organization the Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan achieve the set objectives through Core Programmes which are uniformly distributed amongst the district kendras in the country; implement Schemes of Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports; undertake Special Programmes and Projects in coordination and support of other development Agencies, Ministries and Departments of Centre and State Governments and UNO meant for youth development and empowerment.

A paradigm shifts in the utilization of the vast network of NYKS and its field units has commenced. One such role which NYKS has recently taken as a major initiative has been synergy and convergence of efforts with the Government of India as well as State Governments. Youth Clubs and NYVs now provide ample opportunities and a suitable platform for outreaching various programs and schemes of the Government of India and the State Governments.

The youth associated with Nehru YuvaKendras are not only socially aware, motivated but are also inclined towards social development work through voluntary efforts. For all these years, NYKS activities remained focused both on economic and non-economic development and welfare activities including poverty alleviation programmes with active involvement of Youth Clubs and village communities. However, a lot more remains to be done.

### **AIM**

Aim of Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan is to facilitate Youth for their personal as well as community development and channelize their potential energy in nation building activities through various youth specific programmes and activities.

### **Core Objectives of NYKS Programmes and Activities**

1. Mobilize, engage and empower youth for leadership and overall personality development
2. Develop skills and values to make them become responsible and productive citizens of the country
3. Establish institutional mechanism to generate Youth movement, build Cadre of committed Youth and engage them in Focus Areas of development.
4. Motivate and enable the developed and empowered youth to assume leadership in addressing social and development issues, community welfare and peace building.
5. Provide youth opportunities to participate and exhibit their talent and meaningfully contribute towards Nation Building.

### **Focus Areas**

**1. Youth Mapping, Skilling and Handholding - Aatma NirbharBharat:** In line with the vision of Hon'ble Prime Minister of India to make the country an AatmaNirbhar, NYKS programme and activities were focused on dissemination and amplification of this message among the masses. Youth were encouraged and motivated to go for local made products and make the country's economy strong and robust.

**2. COVID-19: Ongoing Campaigns and Post Lockdown Interventions:** In response to outbreak of COVID pandemic and its disastrous impact on health and economy, the programme to sensitization of individual and community to contain the spread of COVID-19. Youth led groups are encouraged to undertake activities to educate, sensitize and support family and community for special health care particularly to elderly one and vulnerable sections of society. People were sensitized to follow COVID appropriate behavior and public health advisories issued in public interest to stop its further spread and save the country from falling in health crisis.

**3. Establishing Disaster Risk Reduction and Preparedness Teams:** As the Disasters and climate change are key focus areas of global development agenda, Disaster risk reduction(DRR) is recognized as an integral part NYKS programme and activities. It proposes to establish institutional mechanism for organized and structured engagement of NYKS volunteers as first responders in hazard prone areas/districts.

**4. Youth Led Fit India Movement, Youth Wellness and Positive Life Style:** Fit India Campaign is a Youth Led movement to take the nation on a path of fitness and wellness. It provides a unique and exciting opportunity to work towards a healthier India. As part of the movement, NYKS is to encourage and promote fitness culture and sportsmanship among Volunteers, Youth leaders, Members of Youth Clubs and others citizens as way of life.

**5. Clean Village – Green Village Campaign:** Swachh Bharat mission is tribute to Mahatma Gandhi vision of Clean and Green India. Clean India (Swachh Bharat Mission) and Green Village are two important aspects which address cleanliness, sanitation and other environmental pollution affecting human life. Youth are motivated to undertake cleanliness drive with Sevabhav and positive mindset and also to create awareness about need and importance of voluntary labour and its contribution towards social coherence and feeling of dignity of labour.

**6. Jal Jagran Campaign:** In joint efforts of NYKS and Jal Shakti mission, the campaign “Catch the Rain” with tagline “catch the rain where it falls when it falls” nudges states and stakeholders to create appropriate rain water harvesting structures suitable to the climatic conditions and sub-soil strata before monsoon. Under the campaign, citizens are educated and sensitized to understand importance of water conservation and to undertake activities promoting water conservation such as water recycling, harvesting, conservation and rejuvenation.

**Other programmes and activities of NYKS:**

- i. Commitment to Constitution, Patriotism and contribution towards Nation Building.
- ii. Yoga - for Self Development, Harmony and Peace and also Sports and Adventure for positive engagement of youth
- iii. Awareness and assistance for implementation of Hon'ble Prime Minister Flagship Programmes for Social and Financial inclusion.
- iv. Coordination and Synergy among all the Govt. youth organization at National, State and District level and further highlighting the aspects of technology to be incorporated for maximizing the attainment of desired objectives. The organizations such as NSS, NCC, BSG, Youth Clubs, SHGs, Civil Societies, Eco Clubs and other development agencies of repute facilitated NYKS in achieving its objectives.
- v. On National Youth Day (12th January) youth were mobilized for a particular National cause related activity to highlight the importance of youth so as to bring in sense of self pride. This also enabled them for their engagement in mega National Building activities.
- vi. Skilling of Youth Club Members with vocational Skills. Motivated youth to undergo vocational courses by disseminating information and counseling etc.
- vii. Preventive Health Care awareness for inculcating good habits and health practices for preventing non-communicable diseases; distribution of Iron Folic Tablets to adolescent girls; organizing Health Checkup, Immunization for children and pregnant mother's camps; facilitating Institutionalized Deliveries; motivating girls and their parents to postpone her marriage till attaining at least 18 yrs of age. Youth were motivated to engage in the Indradhanush programme for vaccination. This had given them the joy of saving a life.
- viii. Mass awareness to facilitate enrolment of children at elementary educational level, efforts for prevention of school drop outs.
- ix. Drug & Alcoholism avoidance: Say No to consumption of Alcohol and Drugs.
- x. Training on Community Development and Leadership to youth and thereby enabling them to take lead in addressing social and development issues, community welfare and peace building.
- xi. Blood Donation programme, Enrolment of Blood Donors and their Blood Grouping.
- xii. Social Media Training and Promotion of e-services and creation of separate portal for harnessing voluntary services.
- xiii. Awards to youth and youth organizations for their selfless outstanding achievements
- xiv. Development of Youth Groups through formation of New Youth Clubs.
- xv. Promotional of traditional and rural Sports: NYKS through its programmes of distribution of Sports Kits, organization of Block and District Level Sports are encouraging and motivating youth to participate in the rural and traditional sports.

**Strategic Utilization of Services of National Youth Volunteers (NYVs) and NYKS Youth Clubs with the support and guidance of Deputy Director and District Youth Officer**

13,206 National Youth Volunteers (NYVs) were deployed by NYKS across the country.

The services of the deployed NYVs force were optimally utilized. For this purpose, they were trained on the line with the expectations of the current NYKS Annual Action Plan, NPYAD Scheme of MoYAS, and Coordination Activities in identified focused areas as mentioned above.

- Depending upon the number of blocks and villages in a district, NYVs were deployed on cluster of villages having Youth Clubs for implementation of NYKS Core Programmes, NPYAD Scheme and targeted Coordination Activities and follow up activities in their respective allocated areas.
- The youth who were covered under NYK Core Programmes were motivated and supported to organize similar awareness and education programmes in their respective villages. For this purpose, they were facilitated by designated NYVs and resource persons on the identified issues in which they have undergone exposure under NYKS Core Programmes.
- Coordination activities were also taken up by NYKS Youth Clubs by mobilizing local resources and in coordination with other Development Departments and Agencies in the district.
- In order to quantify the outcome, each NY Volunteer was assigned targets.

#### **Coordination, Convergence and Synergy**

In order to provide more programs for the furtherance of the objectives of NYKS and in achieving the set goal; emphasis was given on coordination and establishing linkages with other development Departments, Agencies, NGOs at District, State, National and International levels. The initiatives in this direction are as follows:

- To ensure proper programme planning, coordination, implementation, transparency and monitoring for effective functioning of district NYKs with expected outcomes, meetings of District Advisory Committee on Youth Programmes (DACYP) under the Chairpersonship of Deputy Commissioner / Collector of respective districts were organized district NYKs.
- Similarly, meetings of State Advisory Committee on Youth Programmes (SACYP) headed by Hon'ble Minister of Youth Affairs and Sports of a State and Heads of development agencies and other non-official members were organized by respective State Directors.
- District and State NYKS were asked to establish effective convergence/synergy in different programmes, functioning and other operational areas with NSS and NCC. In this regard, Action Plan highlighting extent of convergence /synergy between NYKS & NSS Youth Volunteers respectively in each other's' programmes was developed.
- Linkages between developmental Ministries, Departments, and Agencies were established for sanction of projects for the development and empowerment of youth, in the identified focus areas and local needs.

#### **Participation of Public Representatives**

There was overwhelming response and participation of Public Representatives viz. Hon'ble Ministers, MPs, MLAs, MLCs as well as Heads of Development Departments and Agencies in NYKS programmes and activities at different levels across India.

#### **Achievements of Nehru YuvaKendra Sangathan (NYKS)**

During the financial year 2020-21, NYKS programme were focused on its 12 Core programmes including 06 Focused Areas programmes. The programmes aimed at strengthening of Youth Clubs and their members associated with NYKS through various capacity building exercise. These programmes were common to all district NYKs. Besides, NYKS also conducted programmes in collaboration with other Ministries/Agencies. Implemented programmes at state and district level in coordination with local government/agencies to mobilize additional resources so as to provide opportunity to conduct more number of programmes and activities for the benefits of Youth and community at large.

## Core Programs

### Achievements of Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan (NYKS)

NYKS during the financial year 2020-21 focused on its 12 Core Programmes and activities. These Programmes were aimed at strengthening Youth Club network and capacity building of Members of Youth Clubs. These Programmes were common to all district NYKs. Besides, NYKS also implemented the schemes of Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports as well as coordinated at District, State and National Level to mobilize additional resources so as to provide more programmes and activities for the benefit of rural youth in particular and village communities, in general.

### Programs and Activities of NYKS

The Programs and activities carried out by NYKS can be broadly classified in the following four categories:

- A. Core Programs implemented by NYKS, with its own budgetary resources (Block Grants released by the Department of Youth Affairs)
- B. Schemes of Department of Youth Affairs viz. NPYAD (National Program for Youth and Adolescent Development) and NYLP (National Young Leaders Program)
- C. Projects in collaboration and funding from other Ministries for Youth Development and Empowerment
- D. Coordination Activities on Voluntary basis with various Development Departments and Agencies

#### A. Core Programs of NYKS

A summary of Core Programmes along with significant achievements are as following:

##### 1. Youth Club Development Program Convention:

The Programme aimed at strengthening the existing network of Youth Clubs with representation from all sections of the Society and publicizing various Government Schemes/ initiatives. Each programme is of 5-days duration programme involving 10 campaigners who cover 50 Youth Clubs. The team members meet and interact with youth leaders, Gram Panchayat Pradhans & Members and other opinion leaders in the villages. An amount of Rs.15,000/- has been allocated for each Programme. Achievements under this Programme are as follows:

##### 2. Block level Sports Meets :

The programme aimed at popularizing and encouraging rural sports and games among Youth Clubs established by NYKS. Besides, it also promotes sports activities as a natural process and way of life in rural India and thereby provide opportunities to youth to exhibit their talent. An amount of Rs.18,000/ is allocated for the organization of each Block level Sports Meet.

### 3. Training of Youth on Clean village Green Village:

The aim is to make aware and motivate people about the need and importance of cleanliness, greenery and non-use of plastic materials, address challenges and barriers for making villages clean, involve youth to beautify their villages and motivate them to keep their nearby Monuments and Cultural Heritage Sites clean and to make villages dirt, filth and plastic free and green. Rs.15,000/- has been allocated for organizing each Programme. Achievements under this Programme are as follows:

### 6. Awards to Outstanding Youth Clubs

The programme was aimed to recognize the voluntary services rendered and encourage Youth Clubs to undertake community development & welfare activities. Youth Clubs have been recognized as catalysts of social change and these Clubs can play a vital role in activities such as skill training, creation of durable community assets in villages, national integration, sports, culture, health and family welfare, environment enrichment, self-employment, women empowerment, eradication of social evils, community development, etc. Awards were conferred at the District level, the winners were awarded a sum of Rs.25,000/- and at the State level the award was of Rs.75,000/-. The Youth Clubs utilize the award money in community development projects/programmes. Achievements under this Programme are as follows:

### 7. Meetings of District Advisory Committee on Youth Programmes (DACYP) and State Advisory Committee on Youth Programmes (SACYP)

This activity is one of the most imperative for the NYKS field functionaries to ensure proper programme planning, coordination, implementation, transparency and monitoring for effective functioning of District NYKs with expected outcomes.

It aimed at bridging gap, if any, between the District Administration and NYK for undertaking coordination programmes and mobilization of resources for youth development and empowerment. In order to render more services to the youth, NYK at district level developed linkages with the district administration, district authorities, eminent social workers and youth leaders, for guidance and facilitation.

The District Advisory Committee on Youth Programmes (DACYP) is formed in each district by the NYK to achieve the desired synergy and coordination.

914 meetings of DACYPs were held under the chairpersonship of District Collector/ District Magistrate which were attended by officers from developmental departments. Similarly, 17 State Advisory Committee on Youth Programmes (SACYP) meeting was chaired by Hon'ble Youth Minister for Youth Affairs & Sports of the State.



### 8. Planning, Review and follow up Meeting

The objective for organizing Planning, Review and follow up Meeting was to review the progress of ongoing programmes & activities of NYKs and monitor the progress with constructive interventions by involving consensus on all relevant issues, to plan innovative projects & programmes for

youth development and empowerment. It was also to suggest measures for strengthening the existing networks of Youth Clubs and to share information about the ongoing schemes and programmes of the Government (both State as well as Central Govt.) for youth development and expedite coordination.

### 9. Disaster Response Teams of NYKS Youth Volunteers for Disaster Risk Reduction

8,312 NYKS Youth Volunteers were trained by NDRF for Disaster Risk Reduction from September, 2019 to March, 2020 from 33 Districts of 27 States/UTs.

**Following activities were undertaken by the trained volunteers:**

- 49 mock drills
- 46 Community sensitization activities through Gram Sabha Meetings
- 174 Discussion Forums
- 697 Awareness campaigns among Youth Club members, in School and in colleges,
- 76 Awareness programme in village fair etc.,
- 209 Quiz Competition,
- 105 Community based Disaster Preparedness Planning activities,
- Conducted State level earthquake mock exercise with Directorate of Relief and Disaster Management, Govt. of Manipur with participation of 60 trained volunteers of NYK Thoubal and Imphal West.

### Relief and Rescue Work :

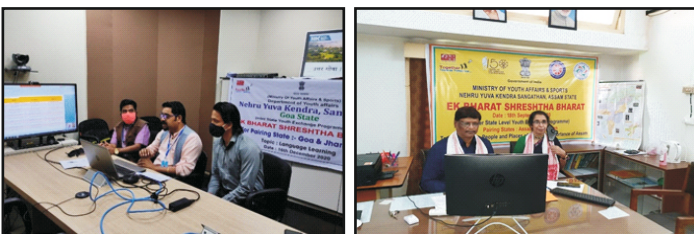
In the month of May 2020, when Amphan Super cyclone hit the coastal states of Odisha and West Bengal, around 120 volunteers of NYK Kolkata(North& South) participated actively in rescue, relief or rehabilitation work. In the month of August, 2020, in the flood affected Bhagalpur District of Bihar, NDRF trained volunteers carried out relief and rescue work. In Chellanam village of Ernakulum district of Kerala, 29 DRT volunteers built wall against high tidal waves at beach following the onset of the Southwest Monsoon. During chathpooja, 35 trained volunteers of Bhagalpur District assisted district administration.



### B. Schemes of Department of Youth Affairs viz. NPYAD (National Program for Youth and Adolescent Development) and NYLP (National Young Leaders Program) and other programmes.

#### 1) National Program for Youth and Adolescent Development – NPYAD

Ek Bharat Shrestha Bharat Programme (EBSB) 2020-21 through virtual mode (Webinar) aims at celebrating unity in diversity of our nation, promote spirit of Ek Bharat Shrestha Bharat, develop understanding and appreciate and establish long term engagement between states, share culture, tradition, cuisines, language and different practices and thereby create better understanding and bonding between states. During 2020 -21, 30 Ek Bharat Shrestha Bharat Programmes were conducted through Virtual mode on two topics on History, People, Cuisine, Culture and Places of Historical Importance & Tourist Interest Language Learning with participation of 19,283 youth.



i. National Young Leaders Program–A Central Sector Scheme, named National Young Leaders Programme (NYLP) for development of leadership skills among the youth was introduced by Department of Youth Affairs, Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, Govt. of India during 2014-15.

The aim is to create an institutional platform where youth can articulate their views on various issues and draw the attention of the local administration to such issues/ concerns affecting their lives, educate youth about contemporary socio-economic development issues and enable them share their experiences and ideas on community development and social welfare activities. As a part of the programmes, issues were drawn from eight categories of topics. During the programmes, besides subject experts, large number of Hon'ble MPs, Hon'ble Ministers, Public Representatives, Members of PRIs, Members of Youth Clubs and Youth Volunteers participated during the deliberations of the programmes.

During the year 2020-21, only Neighborhood Youth Parliaments at Block level were organized by 623 district Nehru Yuva Kendras under NYLP Scheme with the active participation of NYVs and Members of NYKS affiliated Youth Clubs.



**a. Neighbourhood Youth Parliament at Block Level**  
NYKS organized 'Neighborhood Youth Parliament' to educate the members of Youth Clubs about contemporary socio-economic development issues confronting local communities in general and the youth in particular and to involve them in debate/ discussions on such issues.

During these programmes, eminent Speakers delivered talk on contemporary issues like: Good Governance, Youth Participation in Govt. Schemes, Hon'ble Prime Minister Flagship Programmes for Social and Financial inclusion, Swachh Bharat Mission, Construction of Toilets, etc. Attendees Youth Leaders were motivated to conduct similar discussion /debate involving their club members.

After each Programme, the recommendations were drawn up and the same were submitted to concerned Government functionaries as well as the Gram Panchayat for their consideration. In each programme, 80 youth of a particular Block participated in Block level Neighborhood Youth Parliament. Achievements under this Programme are as follows:

### C. Projects in Collaboration and Funding from other Ministries for Youth Development and Empowerment across the Country

Besides its Core Programmes, Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan (NYKS) has also been instrumental in conducting programmes and activities in other spheres and also on issues of National importance as directed by Hon'ble Prime Minister of India himself on different occasions as well as by the PMO, NITI Aayog and other Ministries on the directives of Hon'ble Prime Minister.

It may be appreciated that NYKS has been successful in not only shouldering and implementing given assignments in a time bound manner but also with quality outcome and visibility. Consequently, there has been significantly enhanced involvement of youth from all walks of life, despite limited resources and budget availability with NYKS.

In the above context, following are key major areas where NYKS has strived and made considerable impact.

#### 1. Implementation of the Catch the Rain Project on Water Conservation and Harvesting.

Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan has started a project on Youth Participation-Catch the Rain, where it falls, when it falls” on Water Conservation and Harvesting in collaboration with National Water Mission, Ministry of Jal Shakti, Govt. of India in 623 Districts of all States/UTs of the country.

The aim is to make aware and educate youth leaders and volunteers, families and village communities on the manifold issues and need of water conservation and rain water harvesting and empower youth to assume lead role for educating people to practice.

Under the Project, achievements in respect of key designated activities are as under:

- District Level Launchings were organized with the participation of 2.35Lakh NYKS Officials, National Youth Volunteers, Gangadoots, Youth Volunteers and other Stakeholders.
- 25,219activities of Oath Taking on Water Conservation were conducted with the participation of13.26 Lakh NYKS Youth Volunteers,Members of Youth Clubs, Communities and other Stakeholders.
- 1.16 Lakh activitiesof Advocacy and Environment Building for participation and support for Water Conservation were organized with the participation of 59.13 Lakh Opinion Leaders, Village Spokespersons, Members ofPRIs, Service Providers, Youth, NYVs and others.
- 63,581 activities of Awareness and Education through Theme based Programmes such as NukkadNataks, Padyatra/PrabhatPheries and Rallies were organized with the participation of 31.87 Lakh National Youth Volunteers, Youth Leaders,PRIs, and other stakeholders.
- 13.76 Lakh activities of Community Mobilization and Motivation were organized to mobilize and motivate 83.08 Lakh family members/farmers/members of PRIs and others.
- 21,633 activities of Water Talks and Dialogues were organized in which11.68 Lakh National Youth Volunteers, Youth Volunteers, members of Youth Clubs and other Stakeholders participated.
- 12,613 activities of Knowledge Competitions through Quiz, Poster Making, Painting, Slogan Writing were organized with the participation of 5.80 Lakh Youth Volunteers, Members of Youth Clubs, and other Stakeholders.

- 15,484 activities of Community Work Camps on Voluntary basis were undertaken with the participation of 19.96 Lakh NYKS Officials, National Youth Volunteers, Youth Volunteers and other Stakeholders.
- **A total of 2.27 crore citizens reached/involved by Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan (NYKS) through various designated activities under the First Phase of Catch the Rain Project.**



## 2. Involvement of Youth in Namami Gange

The objective is to develop a Cadre of trained and highly motivated local youth to take up designated activities of the project, to establish an institutional mechanism at different levels for support, guidance, transparency, to sensitize and mobilize support of local youth and villagers pertaining to prevention of pollution of river Ganga and measures for its conservation, to generate awareness and educate target audiences about the consequences and impact of polluted Ganga and to provide information on existing government programmes schemes and services pertaining to construction of toilets, water harvesting, conservation for clean Ganga.

- Various activities were undertaken by Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan, Uttarakhand, Uttar Pradesh, West Bengal and Bihar:-

- ♦ 2 Online Training Course (Training of Trainers) was organized on 6th & 7th October 2020 and 26th & 27th November 2020 for District Youth Officers and District Project Officers.
- ♦ **Capacity building- National level Spearhead team training programme** was organized for DPOs by Wildlife Institute of India (WII) from 5th to 7th January 2021 at Wildlife Institute of India, Dehradun
- ♦ **World Wetlands Day on 2nd February 2021:** 322 activities with the participation of 6164 youth (3083 Male and 3081 female) participated/benefited.
- ♦ 14 activity of Celebration of **International Women's Day**, 121 distribution of dustbin, 44 online awareness activities on social media, 12 activity of development of Ganga Vatika and Herbal Garden, 164 Ganga Manthan/Ganga Chaupal/ Doot Convention were undertaken in which 4137 persons participated.
- ♦ **World Water Day on 22nd March 2021 :** 805 activities like Essay Writing, Painting Competition, Poster Making, Declamation, Talks by subject experts, Rallies, Cleanliness, E-poster, Statue cleaning, Cultural Programme, Awareness, Cycle Rally, Jal Shapath, Plantation, Rangoli, Seminar with participation of 9811 youth.

- ♦ **Ganga Swachhta Pakhwada** was organized from 16th to 31st March 2021 in which a total of 777 activities were undertaken like Shramdaan, Cleanliness and revival of River and ponds, Water conservation and rain water harvesting, contest, Public meetings, Plantation, Nukkad Natak, Cultural Programme, Ganga Chaupal, Ganga Swachhta rally, Oath ceremony, Awareness message in ganga villages wherein 13491 youth participated.
- ♦ In the month of March 2021, 2696 youth associated from NYKS for **Ganga Quest**.



### 3. National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) Workshops through Webinars.

Webinars were organized to generate awareness among youth on the issue of Human Rights and to make them alert about Human Rights violations. It is also aimed at undertaking activities which may protect human rights, besides creating and strengthening networks of Youth Clubs for safeguarding Human Rights.

NHRC-NYKS through this collaborative initiative have conducted 06 Human Rights Awareness Workshops through Webinars for NYKS Officials, National Youth Volunteers and Youth Volunteers from Uttarakhand, Uttar Pradesh, Odisha, Jharkhand, West Bengal, Bihar Assam, Meghalaya, Manipur, Sikkim, Maharashtra, Goa, Chhattisgarh, Madhya Pradesh, Tamil Nadu, Puducherry and Karnataka which were organized on 17th, 19th and 24th November, 2020, 11th, 12th and 16th February, 2021 respectively, with the total participation is 4,881.

### 4. Investor Education and Awareness Programme (Ministry of Corporate Affairs)

Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan (NYKS) and Investor Education and Protection Fund Authority (IEPFA) imparted training to NYKS field functionaries and members of Youth Clubs for spreading message of Investor Education Awareness and Protection. Key activities of this programme are Training of Trainers, Regional /State level Orientation, Block Level Youth Leaders Investor Awareness and Education, Village Level Awareness and Motivational Campaigns.

a) 05 Training Programmes through Webinars for State Directors, Deputy Directors, District Youth Officers, National Youth Volunteers (NYVs) and Youth Volunteers from Uttar Pradesh and Uttarakhand, Jammu, Kashmir & Ladakh, Himachal Pradesh and Punjab & Chandigarh and Delhi, Haryana and Rajasthan, Madhya Pradesh & Chhattisgarh and Maharashtra & Gujarat were held on 30th July, 2020, 5th August, 2020 and 11th August, 2020, 14th October, 2020 and 15th October, 2020 through Cisco WebEx. 1870 NYKS Officers, NYVs and Youth Leaders attended the programmes.

b) 02 Regional level Orientation Programme for NYKS State Directors, Deputy Directors and District Youth Officers on Investor Awareness and Education: on 23rd and 24th November, 2020 at Lucknow and on 14th and 15th December, 2020 at Delhi. 43 State Directors, Deputy Directors and District Youth Officers from Delhi, Haryana, Rajasthan, Uttar Pradesh and Uttarakhand took part.



### 5. Observance of Rashtriya Poshan Maah

The primary aim was to enable awareness on the importance of nutrition and how individual families can easily access Government Services to supplement Nutrition for their Children and Pregnant/Lactating Mothers.



The key feature of this programme was to mobilize communities across the country and gets their participation in addressing various aspects of the Nutritional Challenges.

Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan observed Rashtriya Poshan Maah during the month of September, 2020 with the active participation of National Youth Volunteers (NYVs), NYKS affiliated Youth Clubs, COVID volunteers, Gangadoots and other stakeholders who sensitized villagers on Malnutrition, importance of breast feeding and promotion of Kitchen gardens.

The details of activities undertaken and their achievements are as under:

- 1,125 Webinars were organized with the support of different resource persons on prevention of mal nutrition, especially severely acute malnourished children during and after pandemic with Nutrition experts, best practices and success stories, etc.
- 6.12 Lakh youth and villagers from 74,213 villages were sensitized on the issues of Poshan (Nutrition). Banners and publicity material including digital were displayed/ shared in 74,213 villages. 1862 Meetings with eminent citizens were organized in which 36,274 youth played key role.
- 25,164 Pledge taking activities with 6.54 Lakh youth.
- Messages Dissemination on Poshan Maah through social media platforms which benefited 38.00 lakh youth . 29,057 Rallies, Run, Pad Yatra, Cycle Yatra, Cultural Programmes, Nukkad Nataks, Short Film Shows, Exhibitions, Competitions (Quiz, Painting, Poster Making, Essay and Slogan Writing, Wall Writing, Declamation, etc.).
- The activities carried out by District Nehru Yuva Kendras were given wide covered and publicity by print and electronic and Social Media.



Poshan Pakhwada (16th March to 31st March 2021)-NYKS observed PoshanPakhwada from 16th March to 31st March 2021 with the aim to create awareness on the importance of nutrition and mobilise communities across the country with the active involvement of youth.

- District Nehru Yuva Kendras motivated the NYVs and Youth Clubs to sensitise the villagers on the issues of Malnutrition, importance of breast feeding, promotion of Kitchen gardens in collaboration with District Administration, Anganwadi, ASHA Workers for effective implementation.
- As a part of observance of PoshanPakhwada, following key focus activities were undertaken by NYKS with an active support of National Youth Volunteers (NYVs), Members of Youth Clubs, COVID volunteers, Ganga Doots, Disaster Risk Reduction Team members and others:
- 972 Webinars were organised with the support of different resource persons on topics such as importance of Healthy Diet, components of PoshtikAahar, prevention of malnutrition, sharing of best practices and success stories, etc.
- Created awareness on core issues of Poshan among masses by displaying banners and sharing of publicity material including e-posters
- 168 Poshan Panchayats involving members of PRIs were held to discuss local issues pertaining to health and generate awareness with community participation.
- 12,876 Pledge taking ceremonies were organised in which 3,34,776 youth and members of village communities took pledge for Poshan.
- 9052 Mass Awareness Activities were undertaken through popular modes such as theme based Rallies, Pad Yatra, Cultural Programmes, NukkadNataks, Knowledge competitions (Quiz, Painting, Poster Making, essay and slogan writing, Wall Writing, Declamation, etc.) to focus public attention on Focus areas of PoshanPakhwada.
- 1,29,919 saplings were planted for promotion of Kitchen/Nutri gardens.
- 825 activities of Awareness and Prevention of Anaemia were carried out.
- 980 activities of Awareness on De-warming were carried out to benefit 15,680 people.
- 834 lectures, seminars and discussions were organised.

A total of 3,50,456 youth and villagers were sensitised on the core issues of Poshan (Nutrition) through above mentioned and other activities.



# Other Important Special Programmes/Activities

## 1. National Youth Parliament Festival

The aim is to hear voices of youth through deliberations at district, state & national levels, to encourage and to engage youth with public issues, understand the common man's point of view, form their opinions and express it in an articulate manner and to obtain and document their opinions on Vision of New India.

District Youth Parliaments were organized through virtual mode at 150 District Venues in which 698 Districts (both NYK Districts and Non-District NYKs) from 36 States and UTs in which total 2,34,428 youth participated.

State Youth Parliaments were organized through virtual mode with the total participation of 1345 youth took part. 84 State level Winners from each State took part in the National Youth Parliament at Delhi on 11th & 12th January, 2021.

The three best speakers at the national level were awarded Rs 2 lakhs, Rs 1.50 lakhs and Rs 1 lakh respectively alongwith a certificate of merit. Every participant was given a certificate of participation. The prizes and certificate of merit were given away by **Shri Om Birla, Hon'ble Speaker, Lok Sabha.**

**Shri Narendra Modi, Hon'ble Prime Minister** addressed the attendees of the National Youth Parliament Festival 2021, on 12th January, 2021. He lauded the winners and final panelists of the second National Youth Parliament Festival. Addressing the event via video conference, The Prime Minister had said "your dialogue and deliberations today are very important. As I was hearing you speak, a thought came to me and I decided that I will tweet your presentations from my twitter handle, not just you three winners but, if recorded material is available, I will tweet the speeches of all those who were on the final panel yesterday." The address of Hon'ble Prime Minister was viewed by 27,53,626 NYKS officials, Youth and others viewed Two Days functions of NYPF 2021 on Lok Sabha TV and webcast by NIC.



## 2. Observance of Constitution Day:

### a) Observance of Constitution Day and subsequent activities

As a part of dissemination of basic tenets and spirit of Indian Constitution and also the life and works of Dr. B. R. Ambedkar Ji and to enable the present generation to know the Duties and rights of a citizen, NYKS organized various activities by using social media and web based platforms in the wake of COVID-19 Pandemic. The activities include formation of Whatsapp Group, sharing of messages among youth, formation of Discussion Forum, Preamble reading in houses, Displaying of e-banners, e-posters, flyers on Fundamental Duties, undertaking activities on cleanliness, personal hygiene and Environment conservation initiative in their houses. A total of 81,273 activities with the participation of 32,91,452 youth.



### b) Putting up Preamble Wall in office premises of NYKS Offices.

In the wake of 70th anniversary of the adoption of the Constitution of India, it has been decided to run a nationwide yearlong programme with special emphasis on increasing citizen awareness on Constitution. As a part of this initiative, 615 District NYKs and State Office have put up Preamble Walls in office premises of NYKS offices as an activity of Celebration of Constitution Day and its subsequent activities.



### c) Constitution Day Youth Club Activities

With a view to share and disseminate basic tenets and spirit of Indian Constitution, NYKS organized Constitution Day Youth Club Activities in a campaign mode with the support of National Youth Volunteers, Youth Leaders, Members of Youth Clubs throughout the country. The aim of campaign is to enhance knowledge and information about Indian Constitution among people. As a part of the above programme, 4.27 Lakh Youth Volunteers from 81,473 villages participated in the Webinars/Talks on Constitutional Values and Fundamental Duties; #Samvidhan Diwas were promoted with 7,304 Posts and 27,756 Images; 30,769 Posts of #MeraKartavya shared with impressions numbering 2.76 Lakh; 15,680 Buzz creation/ Publicity Activities for the promotion of campaign with the participation of 8.80 Lakh Youth and other stakeholders; 661 Painting Competition with the participation of 18,523 Youth; 964 Experts delivered lectures on Constitution and life of Sh. B. R. Ambedkar Ji with the participation of 28,149 Youth; 1,326 Slogan Writing activities with the participation of 25,236 youth; 144 Online Quiz Programs with the participation of 1,927 youth; 205 Blood Donation Programs with participation of 14,759 youth; 615 Preamble walls on Fundamental Duties put up. The Extent of total participation was 35.61 Lakh citizen.



### 3. JanAndolan – Awareness and Education to Observe Appropriate Behavior Norms to Combat COVID-19

Adopting appropriate behaviour norms by people are really required to contain the spread of COVID-19 Pandemic. Considering the above, NYKS started **Jan Andolan– Awareness and Education to Observe Appropriate Behavior Norms to Combat COVID-19** with a view to educate & motivate people to observe appropriate behaviour norms to combat COVID-19. NYKS has successfully reached 3.42 Crore Citizens through various activities such

as Making of Face Mask at Home & their right use, Following Social Distancing, Hand Wash to maintain Hygiene, De-Stigmatization of disease, Myths and Misconceptions, Promoting Immunity Boosting AYUSH measures, Encouraging people for COVID-19 Testing, Encouraging Download and use of AarogyaSetu.



### 4. Inauguration of RastriyaSwachhta Kendra and undertaking of GandagiMukt Bharat Abhiyan.

Large Number of NYKS Officials, Youth Club members witnessed the inauguration of RastriyaSwachhta Kendra on 8th August, 2020. Coinciding with the occasion a week long GandagiMukt Bharat Abhiyan was also launched.

As a part of GandagiMukt Bharat Abhiyan, NYKS undertook collection and segregation of single use plastic, Shramdaan/ Cleaning of Public building, Wall Painting on SBM Messages, Shramdaan and Plantation, Online Painting Competition, Cleanliness and sensitization drives and Construction/Repair of Toilets. A total of 3.41 Lakh activities were undertaken with the total participation of 95.13 lakh youth.



## 5. Dissemination of Information on the salient features of National Education Policy 2020.

Government of India has announced National Education Policy-2020. NYKS was assigned the roles of Disseminating of salient features of National Education Policy, 2020, among Students, parents, Gram Panchayats and community. As a part of this, NYKS undertook activities such as sharing of the video on the main address of Hon'ble Prime Minister during the launch of National Education Policy 2020 through WhatsApp and Webinars, Explaining the role of teachers, parents, community and members of PRIs, reaching out to the families, Helping teachers to facilitate reaching of learning materials to the homes of children and teaching young learners by Volunteers who are from nearby places from their home.

A total of 3.90 crores Citizens have been sensitized on salient features of NEP – 2020.



## 6. Harnessing Youth Power to combat COVID-19

When COVID-19 Pandemic set its feet in our country, there were several Challenges to surmount. The Pandemic was new and its remedial measures were hardly known. Further, dissemination of awareness about the Pandemic and its Dos and Don'ts among people in shortest possible time were the other formidable task.

Considering the enormity and emergency of the situation, Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan (NYKS), Department of Youth Affairs with the support of its Youth Volunteers and Members of Youth Clubs as per the directions of the Govt. undertook various initiatives such as **encouraging people to wear Masks and preparation of Homemade Masks, Maintaining Social Distancing, Hand Wash, Hygiene**

**and Personal Cleanliness, assisting District Administration in maintaining control rooms and facilitating relief operations relief and support toneedy, underprivileged, old people, migrant labourers and other vulnerable groups in collaboration with Administration, Medical Camps for the Screening of COVID 19 patients, Marking of Distances at market places and bazaars and host of other measures which were required for the welfare of the people. The accomplishment details are as following:**

- 2.19 Crore persons motivated by volunteers to download AarogyaSetu App.
- 61.35 Lakh Volunteers enrolled on covidwarriors.gov.in
- 1.46 Crore citizens trained in making face masks at home.
- 22.78 Lakh elderly people given care for their protection against the COVID.
- 7.39 Lakh Divyangs reached out and given care during the period.
- 19 Lakh volunteers added during COVID-19 Pandemic.
- More than 62 Lakh volunteers trained on modules of IGOT/MOHFW/WHO/NCDC.



## 7. Combating Stigma & Discrimination during COVID-19 Pandemic.

The aim is to combat Stigma & Discrimination during COVID-19 Pandemic through sustained community awareness and dissemination of messages to address fears of the population and promote love, care, respect and solidarity based on a positive narrative.

Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan (NYKS) with the support of its Youth Volunteers and Members of Youth Clubs undertook various activities such as Advocacy, Capacity Building, Training, Education, Knowledge Sharing to combat Stigma and discrimination, Community Engagement and accountability – Social Mobilization for combating Stigma

and Discrimination and Social Media Engagement for addressing Stigma & Discrimination. NYKS organized a total of 1.91 lakh activities with a participation of 43.62 lakh.



### 8. Observance of National Road Safety Month

Road Safety Month was organized by NYKS in coordination with Ministry of Road Transport and Highway from 18th January to 17th February, 2021 across the country. The aim is to create awareness among general public to improve the safety on roads and to give opportunity to all stakeholders to contribute in road safety. Under the programme, NYKS has undertaken total 6,619 activities such as Walkathon, Pledge and Women's Two Wheelers Rally with the total participation of 13.22 lakh Youth Volunteers, Members of Youth Clubs and other stakeholders.



### 9. Virtual Maritime India Summit

Virtual Maritime India Summit, 2021 is an initiative of Ministry of Ports, Shipping and Waterways, Govt. of India with aim to explore the potential business opportunities in Indian Maritime Sector and strive towards Atmanirbhar Bharat.

NYKS has undertaken the initiative to facilitate participation of youth to make them better informed about the available opportunities in Maritime sector. As part of the initiative, 6,470 youth from nine Maritime states (Andhra Pradesh, Gujarat, Karnataka, Kerala, Maharashtra, Goa, Odisha, Tamilnadu and West Bengal) get them registered for the summit.

### 10. COVID Vaccine Rollout.

The initiative undertaken by NYKS in light of direction from Hon'ble Prime Minister to include NYKS in the successful implementation of COVID Vaccine Rollout. NYKS contributed in the COVID Rollout Campaign with the support of its National Youth Volunteers and Members of Youth Clubs. During the period 2020-21, NYKS undertaken 6,827 activities such as dissemination of correct information on the benefit of Vaccine, building confidence regarding vaccine safety, encouraged people to adopt appropriate behavior and environment building on universal vaccine acceptability across the country with the participation of 6.40 Lakh Youth Volunteers, Members of Youth Clubs, COVID Warriors and other stakeholders.



### 11. बदलकर अपना व्यवहार, कोरोना पर वार Campaign.

The behaviour change campaign "बदलकर अपना व्यवहार, कोरोना पर वार" was started by NYKS 1st June, 2020. It contained a number of Videos and Audios of Hon'ble Prime Minister, Celebrities like Sh. Amitabh Bachchan, Sh. Sachin Tendulkar and Sh. Akshay Kumar and 9 ready to use stencils/posters provided by Department of Drinking Water and Sanitation, Ministry of Jal Shakti, Government of India.

The above material was shared with all the 29 State Directors through Email, Website as well as through Social Media platforms. The same was further shared with District NYKS in 623 districts and their National Youth Volunteers, Youth Leaders, Youth Club Office bearers, Youth Volunteers and COVID-19 Volunteers. Following are the **key achievements:**

a) **Advocacy** (people, organizations, instruments which support /amplify the messages for maintaining Health & Hygiene, Precautionary measures like Hand Washing and positive behavioural changes etc.): 1689 Webinars involving 21, 823 youth leaders. 09 Stencils/Posters and 05 Audio &

Videos were uploaded on NYKS website for public viewing. These have also posted on NYKS Facebook, Twitter & YouTube. 88,925 members of Youth Clubs were motivated and engaged for conducting 5386 activities through social media platforms, virtual methods, wall writings, posters pasting, display of banners, distribution of pamphlets. 19,365 opinion makers/ village elders were associated to undertake activities. 56,867 National Youth Volunteers, Ex-NYVs and Youth Leaders were involved to carry out activities. A total 8945 advocacy activities were organized with a participation of 2,29,263 youth.

**b) Capacity Building** (training, education, knowledge sharing to maintain Health & Hygiene, Precautionary measures like Hand Washing and positive behavioural changes, etc): 68,689 members of Youth Clubs were sensitized by organizing 4357 Capacity Building activities through webinars, virtual modes, social medias. 72,384 WhatsApp Groups were formed with an involvement of 29,28,383 NYKS field functionaries, NYVs, Office Bearers & members of Youth Clubs, COVID Volunteers, and other stakeholders.

**c) Community Engagement and Accountability** - Social mobilization for maintaining Health & Hygiene, Precautionary measures like Hand Washing and positive behavioural changes etc.: Messages were translated in regional/local languages. 10,238 Messages / contents were shared through WhatsApp, facebook, twitter, etc. 43,387 Wall writings/ wall paintings were done by 89,729 members of Youth Clubs. Posters regarding the campaign "बदलकर अपना व्यवहार, कोरोना पर वार" were pasted at prime locations around the Districts at a large scale. Posters, E-posters, Pamphlets and e-generated messages were replicated and displayed. E-posters were also prepared by our field Offices in local languages and shared through Social Media.

**d) NYKS** thus successfully disseminated the 09 Stencils/Posters and 05 Audio & Videos to about 1.17 Lakh villages and more than 23.38 Lakh persons through 89,389 activities. To carry out the envisaged activities under this campaign, more than 2000 NYKS field functionaries, about 12,000 National Youth Volunteers and members of 93,000 Youth Clubs were involved.

**e)** Including these, a lot of creative ways of disseminating the objectives of the campaign were initiated by our Youth Volunteers, like short videos of themselves, making appeals for Health & Hygiene, Stigma and Fear, etc. Wall Painting, Short Video and Slogan competitions were held at District as well as State Levels to encourage the participations in the campaign by using Social Media platforms.. Field and State Offices of NYKS were also able to draw the attention of various Public Representatives, Leaders, Eminent Social Workers during this campaign; which was apparent from the huge numbers of appreciation letters received from the eminent personalities ranging from District Magistrates to Governor and Chief Ministers, Members of Legislative Assemblies and Member of Parliament; praising the efforts of NYKS and its Youth Volunteers. These were further supplemented by placing the activities photos on NYKS Website, Twitter and Facebook of NYKS.



## 12. Atmanirbhar Bharat Abhiyan

District Nehru Yuva Kendras across the country publicized Atmanirbhar Bharat Abhiyan - economic package for the country to become 'self-reliant', to revive the Indian economy and deal with COVID-19 crisis. National Youth Volunteers, Members of Youth Clubs, COVID Volunteers and other stakeholders were involved in publicity campaign.

Publicity Campaign was carried out through WhatsApp group, sharing of PDFs, Awareness of vocal for local, E-Posters, Videos, Documents, etc. through Social Media and Wall writing.

80,000 Villages have been covered and 20,42,338 villagers were made aware about the schemes and programmes included in the package so that eligible people may get benefit out of these schemes.

### 13. Celebration of International Day of Yoga (21st June, 2020)

In view of COVID 19, this year's theme is '**Yoga at Home and Yoga with Family**'. Strictly adhering the instructions of Government, like previous years, Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan celebrated International Day of Yoga on 21st June 2020. Participation of people from all sections of the society in general and youths in particular, has been ensured.

The program was implemented by 623 District Nehru YuvaKendras across the country. Yoga was performed by NYKs Youth Clubs in 1,63,727 Villages in which 39,58,760 families took part. A total 1,97,93,800 National Youth Volunteers, members of Youth Clubs, NDRF trained volunteers, Ganga Doots, COVID volunteers, villagers and other stake holders performed Yoga as Common Yoga Protocol.

**In spite of militant threat in Kashmir Valley**, the District Nehru YuvaKendras with the active involvement of National Youth Volunteers and Youth Clubs carried out Yoga Demonstration Programmes in **Kupwara, Anantnag, Baramulla, Badgam and Pulwama**.

Besides, Yoga exercises were also conducted even in most difficult areas viz. **Andaman & Nicobar Islands, Leh, Nagaland, Mizoram, Manipur, Meghalaya, Arunachal Pradesh and Left Wing Extremist affective districts**.

Yoga Day celebration was widely covered by print and electronic media.



### 14. Skill Mapping Exercise and other Initiatives during COVID 19

NYKShas 24 .17 lakh youth volunteers across the country. Recently, Skill Mapping Exercise was carried out through 623 District NYKs and data of 6,27,761 youth was provided to MSME for uploading on its Champion Portal. The data base of skilled youth includes, Name of Youth, e-mail Address, Mobile No., Location, District, State and Skills he/she is having.

NYKS is providing help to MSME to interact with the NYKS youth volunteers of Bihar, Jharkhand, Odisha, Chhattisgarh, Uttar Pradesh and Uttrakhand for developing user friendly App. The App would be helpful both for Job Seeker and Job Providers.

For this purpose, 05 Cisco WebEx meetings have been conducted in which State Directors, Deputy Directors, District Youth Coordinators and 100 youth participated.



### 15. Celebration of Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav- 12th March 2021

To commemorate the 75th Anniversary of India's Independence as part of AzadiKaAmritMahotsav to celebrate as a Jan-Utsav in the spirit of Jan-Bhagidari. NYKS conducted following programmes :

- **Freedom March:** Shri Narendra Modi, Hon'ble Prime Minister flagged off the 'Padyatra' (Freedom March) from Sabarmati Ashram, Ahmedabad and inaugurated the curtain raiser activities of the 'Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav' (India@75).
- In a contingent of around **81 marchers, 15 permanent marchers include Youth Volunteers of NYKS**. On the event of curtain raising, 100 youth volunteers participated.

- **Pad Yatra from Qutub Minar:** In line with the freedom March of Sabarmati, a Pad Yatra was organised by Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan in which around 500 Youth Volunteers participated. The Pad Yatra was flagged off by Secretary (Youth Affairs), MoYAS; Joint Secretary (Youth Affairs) and Director General NYKS.
- **Cultural Programmes in Qila Rai Pithora:** The Pad Yatra ended at Qila Rai Pithora in Delhi. A series of cultural programmes were organised by Archaeological Survey of India.
- **Conduct of Activities in 623 District NYKs :** NYKS celebrated the day in its 623 District NYKs. The activities conducted include Garlanding on the portrait of Freedom Fighters, Singing of National Song and National Anthem, Photo exhibition, Lectures by Subject Experts, Youth Parliaments, Declamation, essay writing, slogan writing, theme based cultural programmes, yoga etc. A total of 14.27 lakh youth participated in these various activities. Also, Cycle Rallies and Pad Yatras were also organised in District NYKs. A total of 6.37 lakh kilometres were covered by 1.59 Lakh Youth through 2134 activities of Cycle rallies and Pad yatras.



### 16. FIT INDIA Campaign-

“Fit India Campaign” is organised by NYKS with a view to disseminate the theme of Fit India Campaign among maximum no. of people and to educate and motivate youth and villagers to undertake half an hour daily fitness regime. The activities details are as following:

- **Launching of Fit India Movement Youth Clubs Registration on 15th August, 2020** by Shri Kiren Rijiju, Hon'ble Minister of State (I/C), Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, Govt. of India on 15th August, 2020 through Webcast. The programme was viewed by 21,80,700 youth from 96,790 villages,

- **Fit India Freedom Run** was organized 15th August, 2020 by District Nehru YuvaKendras to popularize fitness and inculcate spirit of patriotism. A total 5,07,560 NYKS field officials, COVID Volunteers, Members of NYKS affiliated Youth Clubs, Ganga Doots and NDRF trained youth volunteers and others participated in the Run and covered 10,15,120 Kms. distance.
- **Fit India Youth Clubs Registration-49,635** NYKS Youth Clubs were registered and Fit India Youth Clubs on its website [www.fitindia.gov.in](http://www.fitindia.gov.in)
- **Fit India Dialogue Hon'ble Prime Minister, Shri Narendra Modi** interacted with fitness experts and influencers from across the country to mark the one-year anniversary of [Fit India Movement](http://Fit India Movement) on 24th September, 2020. He launched the 'Fit India Age Appropriate Fitness Protocols' during the online Fit India Dialogue. 9.11 Lakh people witnessed the Fit India Dialogue.
- **51,588 Prabhat Pheries** were organized by District Nehru YuvaKendras with the active involvement and participation of 13.09 Lakh National Youth Volunteers, Members of Youth Clubs and others from different sections of the society took part. 2.74 lakh youth volunteers got them registered on Fit India Portal. 82,736 Hash Tag impressions of #New India Fit India were recorded.
- **25,690 Cyclothon**s were organized by District NYKs to amplify the Fit India Movement Message with the active involvement of NYKS Youth Clubs from 7th to 31st December 2020. 11.56 Lakh Youth from all sections of the society participated. 67.05 Lakh Kms. distance were covered during conduct of the Cyclothon.





## 17. Observance of Birthday of Pt. Deendayal Upadhyaya

Birth anniversary of Pt. Deendayal Upadhyaya on 25th September, 2020 was observed in a befitting manner by District Nehru Yuva Kendras in the country.

On this occasion, with the active involvement of NY Volunteers and members of Youth Clubs, different types of activities such as lectures by subject experts, Essay writing, Seminars and discussions, etc. were organized in which large number of people from all sections of the society participated.

An intensive cleanliness & hygiene campaign was also launched by all District Nehru Yuva Kendras by involving key stake holders in the districts.

Blood Donation Camps were also organised on 25th September, 2020 by various Nehru Yuva Kendras in which 1678 youth donated their blood.

## 18. Fit India Campaign - Promoting फिटनेस का जोड़-आधा घंटा रोज Theme Campaign with #NewIndiaFitIndia.

### ❖ Conduct of Prabhat Pheries

As a part of Fit India Campaign, Prabhat Pheries were organized by District Nehru Yuva Kendras with the active involvement of National Youth Volunteers, Members of Youth Clubs, COVID Volunteers, Ganga Doots, and others from 1st to 6th December 2020 across the country. 51,588 Prabhat Pheries were organized in which 13.09 lakh youth and others from different sections of the society took part. 2.74 lakh youth volunteers got them registered on Fit India Portal. 82,736 Hash Tag impressions of #New India Fit India were recorded.

### ❖ Cyclothon to amplify the Fit India Movement Message

25,690 Cyclothon were organized by district NYKs with the active involvement of NYKS Youth Clubs from 7th December 2020 to 22nd January, 2021. 13.54 Lakh Youth from all sections of the society participated. 41.64 Lakh Kms. were covered during conduct of the Cyclothon.

Cyclothon Activities on NYKS website were uploaded. 3,92,418 Hash Tag Impressions of #New India Fit India were recorded.



## 19. Observance of 125th Birth Anniversary of Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose- Parakram Diwas (23rd January, 2021)

Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan with the active involvement of National Youth Volunteers and NYKS Youth Clubs observed the birth anniversary of Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose, the Indian nationalist whose defiant patriotism made him a hero in India.

The observance of the Parakram Diwas was begun with National Song followed by Garlanding Portrait of Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose, 3-5 Kms. Fit India Cyclothon and Fit India Pad Yatra carrying Tri Flags, Portrait of Netaji and famous quotes of Netaji. Culmination of the Yatra were made at the Statue of Netaji OR any place which is existing on the name of Netaji or a place named after Netaji or a Portrait/Photo Framed of Netaji will be garlanded. In Hilly Areas, where cycles were not available, in such district NYKs, only Walkathons were organized, Screening of Film and Photo Exhibition on Life, Journey, Philosophy and Works of Netaji, Lecture by an expert on Life, Journey, Philosophy and Works of Netaji (Webinar/ Physical – following COVID 19 Safety Guidelines), Knowledge Competitions (Essay writing, Painting, Quiz, Declamation, Theme Based Cultural Programme) on the Life and Works of Netaji and National Anthem, were organized.

On this occasion, 2,957 youth donated their blood voluntarily. 1,75,176 village based Youth Clubs organized 1,05,819 different types of activities in which 31,30,884 youth and others took part.

For Buzz creation and amplification of messages, before and after the event, coverage in both Print and Electronic Mediawas ensured. All types of Social Media Platforms were also used, Activities photos, press clippings, bites and videos were uploaded on NYKS website: [www.nyks@nic.in](http://www.nyks@nic.in).

Parakram Diwas activities on NYKS website were uploaded. 1,04,332 Hash Tag Impressions of #parakramdiwas were recorded.



## 20. International Women's Day (IWD)

Every year, District Nehru YuvaKendras observe International Women's Day (IWD) on 8th March. Different type of programmes and activities including cultural programmes, lecturers by eminent personalities, rallies knowledge competitions such as essay writing, painting, slogan writing, declamation, etc. are organized. This is a part of core programme under Annual Action Plan funded by Department of Youth Affairs, MoYAS.

The eminent speakers on the occasion are invited and they dwell largely on the issues of Health & Education, Land and Property Rights, Crimes against Women, Sexual Harassment - Eve teasing, Dowry, Child Marriage, Female Infanticide and sex selective abortion, Domestic violence, Trafficking, etc. They also speak about the role of social activists/ reformers and had attempted on their life a several time.

Like previous year, this year also observed women's day celebrations with the active involvement of National Youth Volunteers, members of Youth Clubs, COVID volunteers, Ganga Doots, Disaster Mitigation team members and others.

On this occasion, a 3-5 Km. Walkathon / Pad Yatra was organized by District NYKs on 8th March, 2021.

National Programme : Shri KirenRijiju, Hon'ble MoS (I/C), MoYAS, flagged off 3.00 Kms. Walkathon from Jawaharlal Nehru Stadium, New Delhi. 450 male and female youth took part.

Besides, 519 Districts from all States and UTs except the states of Assam, Kerala, Tamilnadu, West Bengal and Puducherry organised programmes and activities including Walkathon in which 12.97 Lakh (8.17 Lakh females and 4.80 Lakh male) from 1.68 Lakh village based Youth Clubs participated and covered 45.39 Lakh Kms.



## Coordination with other Development Departments and Agencies on Voluntary Basis

In addition to Core Programmes, NYKS organized a number of Coordination Activities. Coordination Activities were made an integral part of Annual Action Plan 2020-21 wherein National Youth Volunteers (NYVs) who with the guidance and support of District Youth Coordinators undertook Coordination Activities by involving Youth Clubs.

The objective for undertaking Coordination Activities was to provide more programs for the furtherance of the objectives of NYKS and in achieving the set goal. In this context, emphasis was given on coordination and establishing linkages with other development Departments, Agencies, NGOs at different levels.

# NATIONAL YOUTH CORPS SCHEME

The Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports has introduced scheme called National Youth Corps (NYC) during the year 2010-11, after modifying the earlier schemes of National Service Volunteer (NSVs) (1977-78) and Rashtriya Sadbhavana Yojna (RSY) (2005).

Objectives of NYC scheme are ...

- To setup a group of disciplined and dedicated youth who have the inclination and spirit to engage in the task of nation building.
- To facilitate the realization of inclusive growth (both social and economic)
- To act as points for dissemination of information, basic knowledge in the community
- To act as group modulators and peer group educators
- To act as role models for the younger cohort especially towards enhancement of public ethics, probity and dignity of labour.

As per the provision of the scheme, a total of 13,206 volunteers in 706 districts are being deployed across the country. There is a selection committee under Chairpersonship of DM/DC of the district for selecting volunteers. Volunteers in the age group of 18-29 years are being deployed for maximum period of 2 years duration only. Each volunteer is being paid Rs. 5000/- as monthly honorarium with effect from October 2016. During the year 2020-21, a total of 12245 volunteers were deployed across the country as fresh selection against vacancies could not possible due to Covid-19.

Volunteers act as link between youth club members and concerned NYK/ various other departments.

Volunteers were actively involved in taking up the task of motivating and revitalization Youth Clubs and Mahila Mandals in the village/ community level apart from implementing core programmes and special programmes of NYKS.

Further, it is to mentioned here that the role of NYVs in reaching out to the needy youth in the rural area through the network of youth clubs and their involvement in implementing various youth empowerment programmes have been highly appreciated by many DM/DCs and People Representatives particularly for Covid-19 awareness and prevention activities.

## Schedule 18 (2020-21)

### Notes on Accounts and significant accounting policies

- 1) **Basis of preparation of Financial Statements:** The financial statements have been prepared under historical cost convention in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.
- 2) **Accounting policy :** The Sangathan adopts an accrual system of accounting unless otherwise stated.
- 3) **Fixed Assets and Depreciation :**
  - a) The assets created out of Grants are expensed from General Funds and are transferred to the capital funds.
  - b) The Assets purchased after the formation of the Sangathan are stated on a historical cost basis. These have been re-valued in previous years and consequently depreciated/adjusted and transferred to the Capital Fund. Assets are being stated following Written down Value method.
  - c) The depreciation charged on Written down Value (WDV) method is as follows:

(i)	Furniture & Fixure	10.00%
(ii)	Machinery and Plant (Vehicle, Machinery)	15.00%
(iii)	Machinery and Plant (EDP & Computer)	40.00%
(iv)	Land & Building (only building)	10.00%
  - d) As per the report of the committee of experts on Uniform Format of Accounts for Central Autonomous Bodies” issued in November 2000, the provision for depreciation has been stated on the Straight-line method only as an “illustrative” policy and not a suggested one. Further, as per the document the common format gives the basic structure and its rigid application is not envisaged. Based on the above report, we have prepared our account based on the Written Down Value Method.
  - e) The Assets pertaining to the period prior to the formation of Sangathan were revalued at a notional amount of Rs. 1.00. Similarly Assets received through donations were valued at a notional amount of Rs. 1.00 except the value of land received from the local agencies.
  - f) The Sangathan is wholly aided by the Government of India under budgetary support. A capital fund equivalent to the cost of fixed assets has been created.
- 4) **Recognition of Income / Expenditure**
  - a) Grant in Aid – The grant in aid received from the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports, Government of India, and from other agencies for the year considered on the accrual basis.

Grants received under the NYKS scheme have been considered as income and taken in the Income and Expenditure account. The surplus has been transferred to Earmarked / Endowment Fund (MYA&S).

Grants received for the special / sponsored programs have been considered as ' Earmarked funds' and taken into special fund account. The unspent funds at the yearend have been reported under the liability side of the Balance Sheet.

- b) Interest accrued on FDRs has been recognized on Accrual basis. Figures of interest on Investment, TDS, and value of Investment have arrived on the basis of the Interest certificate provided by the Bank and TDS deducted by them.
  - c) Interest on Saving Fund account, affiliation fee, sale of youth manuals have been accounted for on a cash basis.
  - d) Interest earned at HQ on saving bank account of funds of major special / sponsored programs namely Adolescent, SGSY, UNDP-TAHA, NIC, NYC scheme and RSY/NRC schemes, etc has been credited to respective programs.
  - e) Employee's benefits of Leave Encashment are accounted on a provisional basis.
  - f) The Expenses incurred by the HO and State Offices (PAOs) have been compiled at the headquarters level on the basis of the information and explanation provided by PAOs through their Financial Statements for the corresponding period. At PAOs, expenses have been booked on the basis of UCs received from Kendras.
- 5) **Provisions for Expenses :** During the year provisions of Rs 12.44 crore for Salary for March 2021 have been made.
- 6) **Statutory Liabilities:** There is a balance of Rs. 15.65 crore in the Superannuation Fund, Rs. 55.59 crore in GPF, and Rs 27.84 crore in the pension fund towards statutory liabilities. The General Provident Fund, Superannuation fund, and Pension Fund are shown under current liabilities pending approval of the Ministry on the formation of Trust.
- 7) **Loans and Advances:** Loans and Advances include Rs. 24.87 crore lying unspent with the field offices. Since these figures are under further reconciliation, it may include expenditure already incurred but not accounted for.
- 8) Balances outstanding with Agencies, Suppliers, Zones, Kendras and employees are subject to confirmation.
- 9) Scheme-wise reconciliation of negative balances has been done at different PAOs and the outcome of the reconciliation exercise has been incorporated in the Annual Accounts Statement.
- 10) Accumulated interest and miscellaneous income has been refunded to the Administrative Ministry and adjusted from Earmarked / Endowment funds (MYA&S).
- 11) Previous year figures have been regrouped where ever considered necessary. Figures in financial statements have been rounded off to the nearest rupees.
- 12) There were 2 outstanding paras of the Internal Audit Wing, Ministry of Human Resource Development and 18 of DGA(CE) for which replies have been submitted to the auditors.

### Separate Audit Report of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India on the Accounts of Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan for the year ended 31 March 2021

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of the Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan (NYKS) as at 31<sup>st</sup> March 2021, the Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account for the year ended on that date under Section 20 (1) of the Comptroller and Auditor General's (Duties, Powers & Conditions of Service) Act, 1971. The audit has been entrusted for the period up to 2020-21. These financial statements are the responsibility of the NYKS's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

2. This Separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observation on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules & Regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cum-performance aspects, etc., if any, are reported through Inspection Reports/CAG's Audit Reports separately.

3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about, whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidences supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by the management as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

4. Based on our audit, we report that:

- i. We have obtained all the information and explanations, which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit,
- ii. The Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure/Receipts & Payments Accounts dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the Uniform Format of Accounts approved by the Ministry of Finance.
- iii. In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained **by NYKS, in so far as it appears from our examination of such books**
- iv. We further report that:-

#### A. Balance sheet

##### A.1 Liabilities

##### A.1.1 Earmarked / Endowment Funds (Schedule-2, 3 &4)-Rs 154.05 crore

**A.1.1.1.** As per Uniform Format of Accounts, the excess/deficit of income over expenditure should have been transferred to Capital/Corpus Fund. However, the deficit during the year amounting to Rs. 9.18 crore was transferred to 'Earmarked Fund-MYAS' (Sch. 2), which is in contravention of Uniform Format of Accounts. This has resulted in overstatement of Earmarked Fund (MYAS) and understatement of Capital Fund by Rs. 9.18 crore. This was also reported in the previous year's report; however, no remedial action was taken by NYKS.

#### B. General

**B.1 (i)** As per Schedule-7 of consolidated statement of PAO/Zones of NYKS, there were negative balances in advances amounting to Rs. 12.47 crore. This issue was also reported by audit in the

previous year. However, no remedial action by reconciling these negative balances has been taken by NYKS.

(ii) Schedule-7 includes negative balances in the following heads as on 31.03.2020 and the negative balance has increased as on 31.03.2021 after some adjustments: -

The above needs to be reconciled.

**B.2 (i)** In the Earmarked Funds (Sponsored Programs) under Schedule-4 forming part of Balance Sheet as on 31.03.21, there were negative opening and closing balances under the programmes with 'nil' expenditure and no refund of grant during the year. The aggregate of negative closing balances worked out to Rs. 1.96 crore under three programmes of NYKS.

(ii) There were schemes namely "Life Skill Education Training for Adolescents" (Schedule 3) and "Fit India/SAI Cyclathon" (schedule -4) forming part of balance sheet as on 31.03.2021 with negative closing balances of Rs. 20.85 lakh (Rs. 12.05 lakh-life skill education & Rs. 8.79 lakh- Fit India) in NYKS, PAO, Alipur. The details are indicative of the fact that NYKS had incurred excess expenditure over the grants received. The negative balances need to be reconciled. This issue was pointed out during the previous year also, but no remedial action has been taken.

**B.3** In the accounts of NYKS Headquarters, advance amounts has appeared in the accounts in the following heads of accounts since 2015-16:

These discrepancies were also reported by audit in the previous years. However, no remedial action has been taken.

**B.4** Under the head 'Loan and Advances' (Schedule-7), an amount of Rs. 19.54 crore were shown as advances with Kendras, utilization certificates of whom is still pending. The utilization certificate should be obtained immediately before the finalization of accounts so that the expenditure for the year may be taken to the income and expenditure account in the year of expenditure itself and not shown as advance in accounts. Audit has made repeated observations since long but UCs for huge amount is still pending.

**B.5** Nine saving bank accounts having balance of Rs. 5.45 crore in respect of schemes like National Reconstructive Corp (NRC), Youth Services-IV, Swaran Gram Sadak Yojana (SGSY), Kashmiri Rural Youth Cultural Exchange Programme (KRYCEP), Cultural Exchange (CULTEX), Adolescent, UNDP

Project, Red Ribbon Express (RRE) and Foreign Contribution (FC) were lying dormant as on 31.03.2021 as these schemes were inoperative. Of these, seven bank accounts have been lying dormant since 2011-12, whereas two bank accounts were dormant since 2012-13. This issue was also reported in the previous year, but no remedial action was taken by NYKS.

**B.6** Total grant of Rs. 267.75 crore includes Capital grant of Rs. 3.00 crore which was received during the year 2020-21 and is taken under Income & Expenditure Account in contravention of Uniform Format of Accounts. The capital grant should not be routed through Income & Expenditure. In the absence of actual capital expenditure, the unutilized capital grant could not be worked out.

**B.7** Depreciation of Rs. 3.17 crore is taken under Capital Fund instead of charging the same under expenditure head of Income and Expenditure account. The depreciation needs to be routed through Income and Expenditure in Capital Fund. This has resulted in understatement of expenditure and overstatement of deficit for the year by Rs. 3.17 crore.

**B.8** As per Actuarial Valuation done by NYKS during 2014-15, there was a liability of Rs. 661.92 crore (Rs. 69.91 crore for Gratuity, Rs. 52.87 crore for Leave Encashment and Rs. 539.14 crore for Pension) for retirement dues to the employees. No actuarial valuation has been done after 2014-15 and NYKS has not made the provisions for retirement benefits on actuarial basis during 2020-21 which is in contravention of Uniform Format of Accounts. This point was also raised during previous year but no action is taken.

**B.9** Following issue was raised during the year 2019-20. However, no compliance report regarding rectification and reconciliation of these errors was provided to audit during 2020-21.

The fact remains that there was pending advance for reconciliation which has resulted in poor internal control. This issue was raised during 2019-20 audit also, but no compliance/action was done.

### C. Grants-in-aid

NYKS receives grant from the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports for general purpose and special programmes. It also receives grants from other Ministries/Departments/Agencies for sponsored programmes. The position of Grants in aid received and utilized by NYKS during the year 2020-21 is given below: -

Thus, there is an unspent balance of Rs. 154.06 crore as on 31.03.2021.

### D. MANAGEMENT LETTER

Deficiencies which have not been included in the Audit Report have been brought to the notice of the Director General, Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan through a management letter issued separately for remedial/corrective action.

- v. Subject to our observations in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the book of accounts.
- vi. In our Opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanation given to us, the said financial statements read together with the Accounting Policies and Notes on Accounts, and subject to the significant matters stated above and other matters mentioned in Annexure to this audit Report give a true and fair view in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in India:
- (a) In so far as it relates to the Balance Sheet, of the state of affairs of NYKS, New Delhi as on 31st March, 2021; and
- (b) In so far as it relates to Income and Expenditure Account of the deficit for the year ended on that date.

## Annexure to audit report

### 1. Adequacy of Internal Audit System

- Internal audit of NYKS (Headquarters) was conducted by Pr. AO of Ministry up to 2012-13.
- Internal audit of NYKS (HQ) and its all 6 Pay & Accounts Offices for the year 2020-21 has been conducted by appointed CA firm.
- Internal audit of NYK, Chennai was not conducted by PAO, Bangalore since 2018-19 and internal audit of NYK, Madhurai, NYK, Ramanathapuram and NYK, Virudhunagar were not conducted for 2020-21.

### 2. Adequacy of Internal Control System

The internal control system of NYKS was found deficient due to the following:

- The accounts of NYKS show continuous availability of unadjusted surplus funds under the head Earmarked Fund (Sch. 2) lying with PAOs. Examination of these funds from previous years' accounts shows lack of effort on the part of NYKS for utilizing/adjusting the same. This has led to accumulation of funds and surplus funds of Rs. 60.77 crore remained blocked up to 31.3.2021. (The amount was Rs. 77.50 crore at the end of 31.3.2020).
- Internal Control System is not adequate at NYK Hingoli.
- Cash and bank receipts could not be verified at NYK Hingoli.

### 3. System of physical verification of fixed assets/stock/stores

- The physical verification of fixed assets (Furniture & Fixture, Vehicles and Computer & accessories) relating to NYKS, Headquarters was conducted up to March 2021.
- Physical verification of Fixed Assets has been done upto March 2021 in respect of NYK, Bilaspur and Gwalior.
- Fixed assets register is not maintained in the proper format at Nehru Yuva Kendra, Bilaspur

### 4. System of Physical verification of inventory

- Physical verification of inventory has been conducted in respect of NYKS headquarter up to March-2021.

### 5. Regularity in payment of statutory dues

As per the information provided, no statutory dues over six months were outstanding as on 31.03.2021.

<b>A.1.1.1</b>	<p>The grants provided to NYKS by the Administrative Ministry under 'NYKS Scheme' are tied with the specific objectives of the scheme on stipulated terms and conditions including condition to refund unspent balance with interest. These are not specifically provided for creation of Corpus.</p> <p>Therefore unspent balance of grant/ surplus of Income &amp; Expenditure Account shall not be treated as CORPUS FUND.</p> <p>Hence it has been earmarked in consonance to the definition of Earmarked funds provided by the uniform format of accounts.</p>
<b>B.1(i)</b>	Observation of Audit is noted for compliance
<b>(ii)</b>	<p>Employees of NYKS are transferable in 623 district and 29 state level offices. Their transfer and posting may involve change in the jurisdiction of one PAO to another.</p> <p>Long term advances including HBA, Vehicle and Computer advances are sanctioned by the HQ and disbursed by PAOs. Recovery of principal amount of advances and interest is made by PAOs from monthly salary of concerned employees and remitted to HQ.</p> <p>Negative balance for HBA, Vehicle advance/ scooter advance, Computer Advance, LTA includes amount of interest recovered on such long term advances. The quantum of amount towards interest on long term advance is being identified year wise and this will be bifurcated/ shown as Interest on Long Term Advances in annual accounts statement of 2022-23.</p> <p>Programme advance/ advances with Kendra pending UCs are also being reconciled in each PAO and necessary adjustment will be made in Annual Accounts of 2022-23.</p>
<b>B.2(i)</b>	Negative balances in the schemes are mainly due to classification error made in previous years and not results of over expenditure. The concerned schemes are closed schemes hence no new expenditure under such scheme is made during the 2020-21. Suggestion of audit is noted for compliance and necessary rectification after due reconciliation process.
<b>B.2(ii)</b>	In the Annual Accounts Statement of PAO Alipur for 2020-21, balances under scheme namely "Life Skill Education Training for Adolescents" (Schedule 3) are showing in two separate columns. 1 <sup>st</sup> under Adolescent Programme with positive balance of Rs 48,30,362/- and 2 <sup>nd</sup> under Life Skill Education Training for Adolescents with negative balance of Rs 12,05,522/-. Both the balances are of same scheme but shown in two different columns.

	<p>These balances have been corrected in Annual Accounts Statement of PAO Alipur for 2021-22. Similarly, negative balance under Fit India/ SA<sub>1</sub> Cyclothon is being reconciled and rectified in Annual Accounts of PAO Alipur for 2021-22.</p>
<b>B.3</b>	<p>The negative balances are under reconciliation and appropriate adjustment entry shall be affected in Annual Accounts statement of 2022-23.</p>
<b>B.4</b>	<p>Advances over field offices in books of PAOs are being reconciled and adjusted by appropriate entries by NYKS field functionaries on regular basis. Due to continue efforts of recompilation and adjustment of advances, the quantum of advances have been brought down from Rs 34.04 crore (as on 31.03.2020) to Rs 19.54 crore (as on 31.03.2021). The process is still on and remaining advances of Rs 19.54 crore are also being reconciliation and appropriate adjustment entry shall be affected in Annual Accounts statement of next years.</p>
<b>B.5</b>	<p>These saving bank accounts were opened in NYKS-HQ in previous year on request of funding agencies. These schemes are non operative at present, therefore, the observation of audit is noted for compliance. Matter of closing of dormant account is being taken up and with approval of the Governing body these accounts shall be closed in 2022-23.</p>
<b>B.6</b>	<p>The Capital grant of Rs 3.00 crore has been fully utilized during 2020-21 and its utilization has been reported through Schedule 17 of the Annual Accounts Statement, drawn for Cost of Assets, as part of balance sheet. As such, there was no un-utilized balance of Capital grant for 2020-21.</p> <p>Observation of audit for not routing the Capital Grant through Income &amp; Expenditure Account is noted.</p>
<b>B.7</b>	<p>At the time of procurement, cost of assets is 100% charged off by NYKS out of allocated grant and being shown in Capital Fund. By charging depreciation on year to year basis, the historical cost of assets is revalued in capital fund.</p> <p>Charging of depreciation under expenditure head of Income &amp; Expenditure Account shall make double effect on expenditure, i.e., 1<sup>st</sup> at the time of procurement 100% and 2<sup>nd</sup> at the time of charging depreciation on defined rates.</p>
<b>B.8</b>	<p>NYKS had sought concurrence of the Administrative Ministry to show the valuation of retirement dues in annual account statement as liability. The Ministry of Youth Affairs &amp; Sports vide EFC Memorandum dated 06.06.2018, submitted demand to the Ministry of</p>

	<p>Finance for Pension liability of NYKS. The matter was discussed at length in the EFC meeting held on 13.08.2019 and as per minutes of the meeting dated 05.09.2018, NYKS has submitted proposal on 'Demand of one time contribution of pension fund' to the Ministry on 30th November 2018 further clarification sought by the Ministry of Finance/Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports in this regard were also submitted. Decision on the matter is pending. Therefore, provision of retirement benefits under Annual Accounts Statement will be shown on receipt of concordance of administrative Ministry. However pending decision on the matter NYKS has shown this liability in Notes of Accounts</p>
<b>B.9</b>	<p>NYKS has a structure going down to the 623 District level offices, 29 State Level Offices and its national headquarters at Delhi. Since no appointment was made in NYKS during last two decades, about 50% of sanctioned posts were vacant till 2019-20. That effected routine functioning of field offices and thereby issues of reconciliation were arising.</p> <p>By posting of new strength after 2019-20, internal control system in NYKS has been strengthened. CRC has been implemented in NYKS during 2020-21, new posts of supervisory level have been created and existing PAOs are also being restructured. Thereby, NYKS is strengthening its internal control system day by day.</p> <p>Observation of audit is noted for compliance. PAO Gandhinagar has been directed to reconcile the pending advances in time bound manner and settle the same.</p>
